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In 2018, Russia reported on the *Disaster Resilience for Pacific SIDS (RESPAC)* project financed through the Russian Federation-UNDP Trust Fund for Development. The overall project goal is to effectively address the consequences of, and responses to, climate-related natural hazards. The outcome will be achieved through three outputs (also referred to as components): 1. Strengthened early warning systems and climate monitoring capacity; 2. Preparedness and planning mechanisms and tools to manage disaster recovery processes strengthened at regional, national and local level; 3. Increased use of financial instruments to manage and share disaster related risk and fund post disaster recovery efforts. Duration of the project: 2016-2019. Funding from Russia: \$7.5 million.
